Carmil Ritchey, DTM—Division E Director, answers questions posed by the editor. In this getting-to-know-you article, Carmil shares highlights from her Toastmasters journey.

Why did you join Toastmasters?

I joined Toastmasters originally in the early 1990s as a charter member of a corporate club for Farmers Insurance Group in Vancouver, Washington. Unlike most people, I enjoyed public speaking in high school and college. So, I was excited to be a part of this new opportunity.

The communication and leadership skills I learned helped me move into a middle management position within the firm. It also helped me as I served as the Washington State Director of the National Association of Insurance Women and on the Board of Catholic Community Services.

As I made career changes, at times relocating, I didn't always maintain my Toastmasters membership. But I always came back because I found that if you don't practice a skill, you lose it.

I last joined Toastmasters in 2003 and have maintained my membership continuously since then. Currently I belong to Clackamas Stepping Stones and to AAA Towsters, a corporate club for AAA of Oregon/ Idaho.

What has been your greatest Aha! Moment in your Toastmasters journey so far? Why?

The biggest Aha! Moment has been the realization that I have so many dear friends among my Toastmasters family. People who have supported me during my job hunt, through the loss of my father, and through everyday challenges at home and at work. Membership in Toastmasters for me is more than developing communication and leadership skills- much more.

What do you do outside of Toastmasters—hobbies, interests, etc.?

Outside of Toastmasters I enjoy painting with both watercolors and acrylics. I spend time promoting my children's book, "The Adventures of Pine Cone the Cat". My husband and I like to go antique shopping. We also love to travel, primarily taking road trips throughout the United States sometimes with our dog Bandit.

How has Toastmasters enhanced your work at AAA?

Belonging to Toastmasters has helped me in many ways. It has allowed me to



lead meetings effectively. It has helped me to present information confidently to large groups. It has given me the skills to lead discussion groups. It has helped me to become an active listener whether interacting with employees, colleagues, or our members.

Belonging to AAA Towsters has enhanced my work at AAA by allowing me to get to know team members from across the organization—people I may otherwise have never met.

You've been in Toastmasters since 2003.

What are some of the highlights of your career so far?

Serving as Area Director in 2016-2017 was one of the most challenging and rewarding parts of my Toastmasters career. Visiting all the clubs in my area multiple times was enlightening. You learn every club has its own personality and way of doing things, yet they are all moving forward and living the mission of Toastmasters International. Conducting officer training and speech contests tested my ability to plan and manage projects. After successfully completing these events, I felt so gratified.

Another highlight was the privilege of mentoring 3Stripe Adidas Toastmasters in 2019 during the first year after they chartered. The energy and professionalism of that club made my mentor visits a joy. Seeing them achieve distinguished status their first year was wonderful.

Helping AAA Towsters get out of suspended status and become a distinguished club last year was definitely a highlight. From 7 members we have grown to a healthy club of 23 members.

Perhaps the biggest personal highlight was receiving my Distinguished Toastmaster Award in September of 2019 after all these years.

As Division E Director, what is your vision for the Division this year?

My vision for the members of Division E is to feel supported and well informed by their leadership team. I would like for them to know that their Area and Division

Directors are a resource they can come to for answers, information, and help throughout the year.

What are your personal plans and goals for next year?

My personal goals include getting prepared for retirement in the next few years. That includes eliminating debt, planning where my husband and I would like to live during retirement, and dreaming about road trips to come.

ONLINE: THE NEW NORMAL

Finally, many clubs are requesting help to get online access and training on how to conduct Toastmasters online meetings.

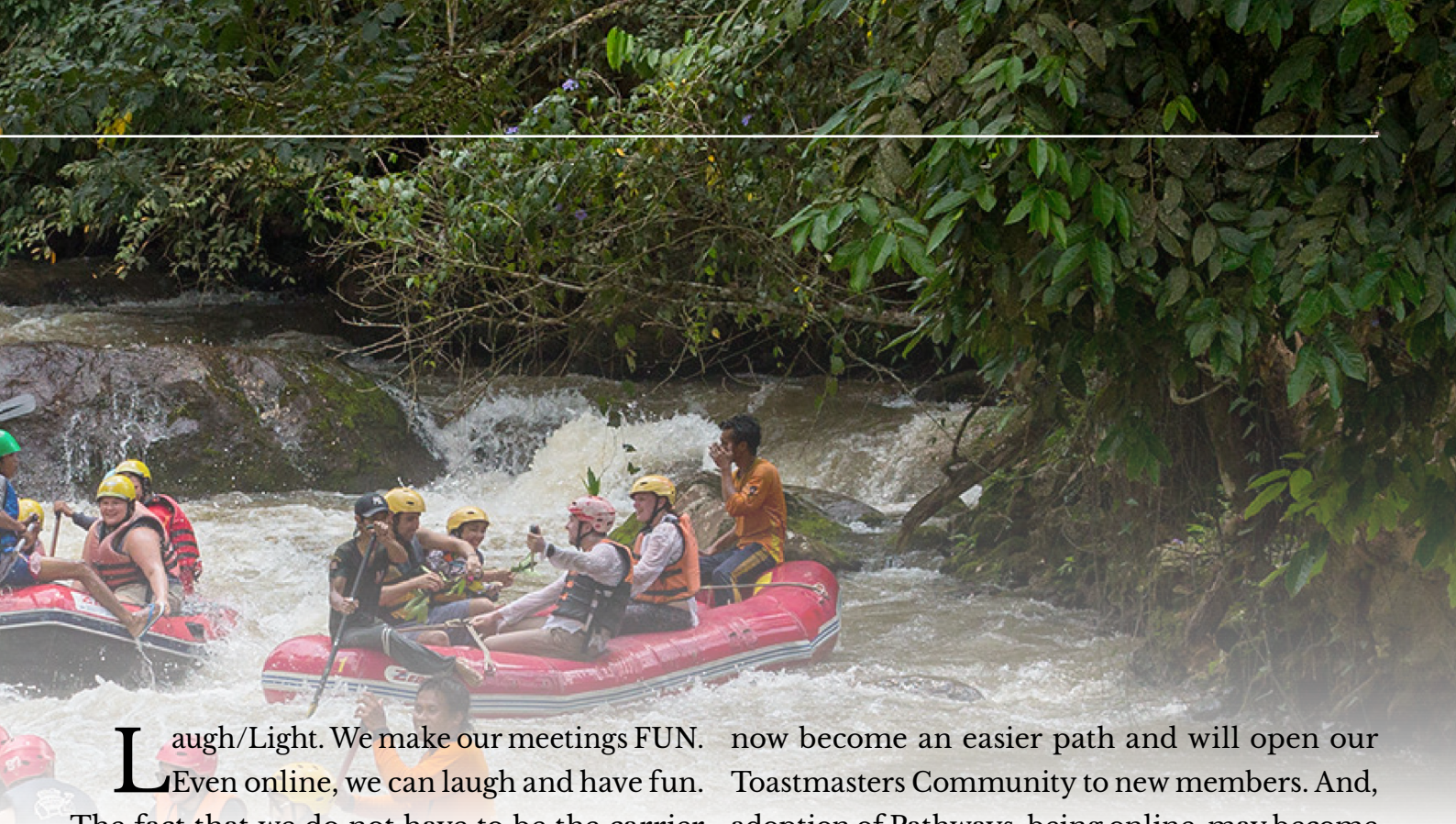
The world is filled with panic and fear. There is so much to think about in our own lives.

It seems the most often used word after Covid-19 is actually ONLINE. Let’s look at it as an acronym and make sense of it with Toastmasters in mind.

Open-hearted Optimism/Opportunity.
We look for ways to connect with open

hearts to all. There are opportunities to call and check on friends and family. We are forced to be closer to home and find ways to occupy ourselves. How about ideas on communicating more effectively? Perhaps we can share Toastmasters’ ideas with others and give them an opportunity to improve their communication skills. We now have opportunities to take our raft into the stream and bring some friends with us on the river of self-improvement and personal growth!

Nimble “quick and light in movement; agile.” As a Toastmaster, I have learned to be quick. Table Topics has taught me how to come up with answers that are organized and thoughtful in a very short time. We need to be nimble and thoughtful as we adapt to other means of communication. At least for a while, face to face 6 feet apart in social situations will be the new normal. In our case, no physical meetings or gatherings. We can however be close to one another by phone, Skype or Zoom! This will test our nimbleness. We have to put our oars in the water and adjust for the rapids that may come our way.



Laugh/Light. We make our meetings FUN. Even online, we can laugh and have fun. The fact that we do not have to be the carrier or receiver, brings some comfort. Physicality shouldn't limit us. We as Toastmasters can be light hearted as we continue forward from where we are. It is easy to fall prey to all of the fear out there and in the media. We strive to be safe and put on our life jackets by staying home. We know in the rafting example, by wearing our life jackets, we can travel the river with more confidence.

Illuminate/Imaginative. Ideas and Imagination help us see the goal to continue our meetings and grow in our leadership and communication skills. While the rest may be huddling in the darkness, we are sharpening our minds. Our shared imagination and ideas will be that splash of fresh water that wakes us up on our journey forward!

New Normal. Online meetings will be our New Normal for the time being. We will learn and we will help each other adapt. Online meetings will become more important to our "New Normal." Blended Clubs may

now become an easier path and will open our Toastmasters Community to new members. And, adoption of Pathways, being online, may become easier for those who resisted previously. Those that know Pathways will be the rafting guides for those who do not. We applaud all of you in advance for stepping forward in advance and sharing what you know. This will help all of us on our forward journey. Thank you!

Effective/Energy. We will have more fun because we will think of ways to bring our energy and enthusiasm into our meetings and life in general. Our energy steers our raft in the direction we wish to go. Pointing it toward our goals of growth and learning will move us forward. What we put into our journey we will get out. I urge all of us to use our energy in positive ways. Each club is a raft that we share! Find and share ideas with us that will bring fun to our situation.

I am impressed by the response from our Leadership Team. The Mock Online Evaluation Contest was a success. Our Division Directors stepped up in a big way to learn the ropes and how to paddle. Our Area Directors have continued their outstanding service to our Area

Clubs. And our Club Officers have continued their excellent service to help members navigate these uncharted waters.

As we go through this period, let's remember that we have our Toastmasters Community. This is the time to reach out to our members, call and say hello and tell each other that you care.

Club Presidents and VPEs were sent links to reserve their meeting times on the expanded Zoom Meeting platform. Please let your clubs know that they have this platform to use at this time, or at least up to June 30, 2020. Be your best, do your best, help others as you can. This is much bigger than Toastmasters.

Trying Times

“The only thing we have to fear is fear itself.” When President Franklin D. Roosevelt uttered those words in 1933, he was addressing a nation that was in a panic over the extreme measures needed to overcome the Great Depression.

When I was young, the threat of total nuclear annihilation was what triggered our fear and anxiety attacks. In addition to routine fire drills, we also practiced assuming the position to save ourselves in case of a nuclear attack by those commies that were lurking around every corner. We knelt by our desks, heads down, with one forearm protecting our eyes and the other protecting the back of our neck, while our little behinds were sticking up in the air. As an adult with a better grasp of physics, I now realize that those measures would do little to help us survive a nuclear blast. The only good they would do was to put us in a better position to facilitate kissing our butts goodbye.

When I was a little bit older, but still during the Cold War, I remember hearing a radio interview where the speaker told us that it would not be a massive nuclear explosion that would get us. Antibiotic-resistant, microscopic critters would lead to the demise of all human beings. We’ve managed to keep developing new antibiotics to stay one step ahead of the ever-evolving bacteria, but they don’t do any good against viruses.

That brings us to the coronavirus pandemic which is dominating the news. We’ve seen its effect at the grocery store, sporting events, and

yes, even our Toastmasters meetings. Remember the good old days when the only thing on your mind was fear of public speaking? Now I’m thinking, “Did the Toastmaster just cough into that hand I’m shaking?” “Did that person sitting next to me just come from visiting their sick parent at the nursing home?” “Will I run out of toilet paper?”

The things that are really keeping me up at night are how to finish our Division contests online, and how to schedule an in-person District Conference when we don’t know for sure when the social distance restrictions will be lifted. As a chronic planner, all the uncertainty fuels my anxiety levels. Unfortunately, fear and anxiety often develop a reinforcing feedback loop until they take on a life of their own and prevent us from thinking and acting rationally. The only solution is to plan, plan, plan! Yes, plan, then make contingency plans, and then contingencies for the contingency plans.

With all the uncertainty, I’m reluctant to give you any dates, but I’ll go out on a limb. I can tell you with 100% certainty that the District 7 Conference will NOT happen as planned on April 24-25. We are currently trying to secure a venue for June 5-6, but stay tuned! We will update the D7 Events Calendar and the Conference website when we have new information. Meanwhile, my advice comes from the British World War II poster. . . “Keep calm and carry on”.

COVID-19 and Club Growth

WOW! I can't say I've experienced a time this crazy since September of 2001. The coronavirus epidemic has forced the cancellation or postponement of everything from our District 7 annual conference to my weekly church services. We're all making adjustments! Even our International Board of Directors and the staff at World Headquarters are scrambling to adapt to an ever-changing landscape. Having given you that background, please allow me to share with you some of the adjustments that have been made at the District and International levels to foster club growth and membership retention during this public health crisis.

Membership Renewals

This pandemic couldn't have hit us at a less opportune time in the lives of our clubs than our spring membership renewal period. Recognizing this, our International Board of Directors has extended the due date for membership renewals to April 30. You now have until April 30 to pay your dues so you can continue receiving the benefits of full participation in the Toastmasters

educational program. Your clubs now have an extra month to pay dues to remain clubs in good standing. You will remain eligible to compete in your Division speech contest if you haven't paid dues before April 1. Your access to Pathways Base Camp will also not be interrupted on April 1 if you haven't paid your dues yet.

Area Director Club Visits

Online participation in club meetings has become the only alternative for most of our District's clubs due to the social distancing rules announced by Governors Jay Inslee (Washington) and Kate Brown (Oregon). Our International President, Deepak Menon, has asked me to encourage our Area Directors to continue conducting club visits, online if necessary. The experience of conducting online club visits can be valuable as a way for your Area Directors to observe how creative and positive clubs can be with this transitional time and allow them to lend a hand in a supportive role as needed. If your club decides or has decided to move its meetings online to comply with



social distancing requirements, please let your Area Director know so he/she can log on to one of your club meetings and conduct your club visit that way. If your club needs access to an online meeting platform, please let your D7 Trio know so we can connect you with one.

New Clubs

Even in this changing economy where so many people are working from home, I'm still supporting the efforts of those in our district who are working to sponsor new clubs and working with companies to build partnerships that will generate leads for new clubs. If your employer is looking to reap the benefits of participation in the Toastmasters program or you know of a company or community group that's open to becoming the home for a new Toastmasters club, please submit your lead to me (cgd@d7toastmasters.org or eldred.brown.tm@gmail.com) with the person's name and email address. The New Club Leads Incentive is still going, so if your new lead results in a demo meeting, even an online demo meeting, you will qualify for a \$50 purchase of

the apparel of your choice at the Toastmasters International Shop.

The coronavirus pandemic has led to a lot of (hopefully short-term) changes in our society and social lives. I understand the stresses you're all feeling from these rapid changes and tightening restrictions, for I'm feeling them too. Rest assured, though, that Emilie, PJ, and I are doing the best we can to continue pursuing our mission to build new clubs and support all clubs in achieving excellence even during this public health crisis. We are here for you. Feel free to ask us for any support your club needs to adapt to this ever-changing social environment.

The Girl with the White Hair

This story is the result of The Better Speaker Series #274 “Selecting Your Topic” which any club can conduct for its members.

I don't know why, but I awakened with a start in the middle of the night last week. Yes, I was under the warm and toasty covers, it was fairly quiet, yet I could not fathom why I awoke so suddenly. Perhaps it was my dinner exacting its revenge on me? No, not that. Or was it quite possibly watching the last forty-five minutes of James Cameron's Titanic? Aha. That must have been it—hearing in my dreams the screech and groaning of the metal rendering as the ship's aft portion fractured off, the shrieking of the doomed passengers and the eventual plunging into the cold and relentless depths the two halves of the jewel of the White Star Line fleet.

I have always had an affinity for the White Star Line, its pennant of red with the five-pointed white star emblazoned on it fluttering from ship after ship, always named with the ending of “ic”. Famous, of course, for the Olympic class

of three passenger ships, fast engines, huge in length and breadth, elegant and safest built to date called the Olympic, Britannic, and Titanic. Two ended up on the ocean floor after sinking, and the Olympic was holed below the water line when she collided with a Royal Navy ship. Eventually, the demise of the White Star Line as a company came about with the forced merger with her rival and even more famous Cunard Lines of the RMS Queen Mary and RMS Queen Elizabeth liners. I can blame my grandmother for my fascination and historical interest in ocean liners and the tragedy of the RMS Titanic, soon to be remembered again after 108 years since she sailed to the United States, never to arrive and never to be seen again for decades.

My grandmother (never grandma or other less-than-formal titles) was born near London in the year 1906, a full six years before the Titanic's



fateful voyage. Being born in England in the Edwardian era, a time when medical care was not that advanced, she lost her mother at childbirth and her father never remarried despite having eight children. When she was around eight or nine, she sat behind a girl in school who always covered her hair. (My grandmother to her final days took great pride in her hair.) This again being an age when one was polite and pretended to ignore the obvious or unusual about someone, dearest May finally succumbed to her curiosity and asked the question, “and why do you cover your hair?” The girl, thin, tall and always appeared pale in complexion, replied simply by letting her cover reveal the secret that is hid so well. Her hair was white. Lamb’s wool white. Not a blonde that was so light it appeared white, it was w-h-i-t-e, period. Now dear reader, you and I are not bound by the confines of another age, and we would be asking a thousand questions of this odd appearance of the girl’s hair. It took some time for my grandmother to wheedle out

the story of the unique and stark appearing coiffure that sat before her every day. Wouldn’t you like to know the story? I know that I did!

Thus, the story unfolded with the revelation that the girl who sat there was an orphan, losing mother, father, and brother in 1912. Grandmother May lost her mother in 1910, so she had an understanding, empathy and sympathy for this poor child.

Alas that wasn’t the whole story. More unfolded in the days that followed. She was living with a spinster aunt, a cold, prim, and proper woman with no time for an active eight-year old. Rather than string this out for the next two or three months, I will synthesize it down for us all.

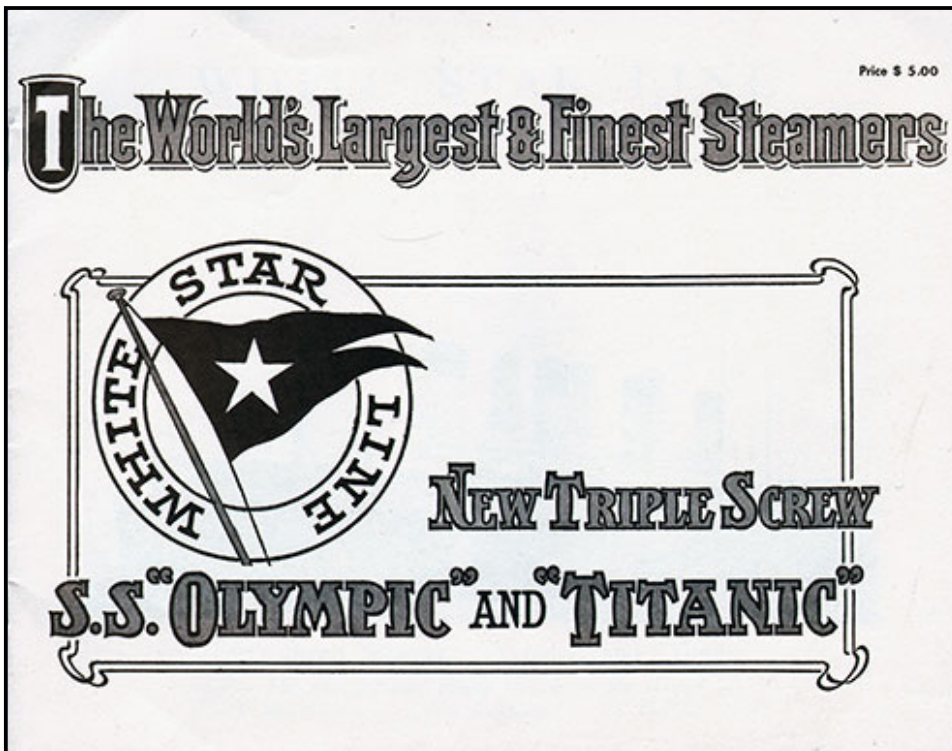
Mary, for that was her name, had a loving mother and father and a little brother of about 2-years old. Their father, a banker by trade, was asked to take-up a post in a British-owned bank in New York City and was invited to bring the family with him and live in the Americas. He counted himself lucky to book passage on the

newest ocean liner on her maiden voyage to “the States” in April 1912, the Royal Mail Ship Titanic leaving from Southampton. Their household goods were to accompany them in the hold as well as their motor car. They themselves, while not first class, at least had second class tickets and a spacious cabin, dining room and amenities available to them. They boarded at Southampton, perhaps waved goodbye to friends and father’s co-workers, anticipating their new life in New York.

You can now guess what transpired next. A few days of nice weather, then turning to the traditional North Atlantic route towards Canada where ice bergs had been sighted by previous ships. Full speed ahead went Commodore Edward Smith, captain and master of the Titanic, to their watery grave as over 1500 passengers and crew members died on the evening of April 15, 1912. Mary remembers last seeing her father help her mother and little brother into a lifeboat. She somehow had become separated from her

mother in the crush of the crowd, and was placed in another boat and given to the safety of a crew member who kept telling her not to worry as the other boat would be next to them shortly. She never saw her mother or little brother again. Her boat was rescued later in the morning, and she frantically looked for her family among the 720 survivors on the RMS Carpathia. They weren’t to be found. Landing in America, as an orphan with no relatives in the U.S., she was returned to Britain and an aunt was eventually found to take her in. She slept poorly at night, wouldn’t go to the seaside for holiday, and hated hearing the steam whistles of the railway engines as they reminded her of the Titanic’s mournful cry for rescue. One morning, she was horrified when she looked into the mirror and discovered that her hair had turned pure white during the night. Forever more, she would bear that mark of her life radically changed from one of a new hope in the Americas to horror of the tragedy near Newfoundland aboard the Titanic.

Grandmother would never see Mary again after the completion of that term, but she would always be remembered to her as the shy, troubled pale-haired girl who sat ahead of her in class and the passing on of her account to her family and especially her grandson while he grew up. And now, fellow Toastmasters, I bequeath this tale to you, the legend of “The Girl with the White Hair.”





Is Your Club Considering Throwing in the Towel?

We knew we had two options; throw in the towel or rebrand, rename, and start fresh.

February 2017 Tell Me a Story was born. In a few short months we took a club on the verge of collapse to Select Distinguished by:

- Changing the name to Tell Me a Story
- Refocusing as a storytelling club
- Planning good meetings with all the elements
- Inviting members from other clubs to fill roles
- Bringing in speakers from other clubs
- Creating flyers for each meeting advertising our speakers which were
 - Posted on Facebook
 - Emailed to other clubs
- Supporting our new members

Historically, the club had been Presidents Distinguished three times, no years were consecutive. We achieved Select Distinguished in 2017. In 2018 and 2019, we were Presidents Distinguished. This year we are well on our way

to maintaining that trend. It is now part of the club's DNA.

How are we able to continue this success for multiple years? Excellence. The dictionary says, "excellence is the quality of being outstanding or extremely good." Every week we work to hold excellent meetings.

What constitutes an excellent meeting? Roles filled in advance. All speeches are from manuals or Pathways. We evaluate all speakers and all aspects of the meetings. Like our members, our meetings are a work in progress.

Guests are crucial to the club's well being—guests that convert to members. We welcome them and provide a name tent and guest packet. Visitor forms are handed out and collected for follow up before the next meeting. Guests are introduced, invited to participate in Table Topics, and asked to give their impressions at the end of the meeting. When guests visit our club we want them to have an excellent experience.

A key ingredient to a successful club is well-trained club officers. We place a high value on officer's training. Officers owe it to themselves and the members to understand their roles and carry them out. Our members have the opportunity to participate in speech contests. Once a year we go out after a meeting for food and libations. We enjoy one another's company and the comradery we share every week. A successful club is work. In my opinion it's worth the effort,

Opening night is here, there is a packed house of paying patrons, and I am one of three actors facing fourteen performances over 3 weeks. I am waiting in the wings for my cue to enter the stage. I know that when I walk on stage I can show no hesitancy, discomfort, or lack of confidence. They paid good money and are expecting to see a good performance, not my hesitation or fear.

At my cue, I enter the stage in character without a hint or trace of fear. I feel all those pairs of eyes swivel to lock onto me. I rely on my routine to get me through this performance. The play is on!

Stage fright is real. I face it every time I walk in front of an audience, conduct a training session, or give a speech at my home club. Before every performance I had a routine; it helped me get into character and set aside my fear. Every seasoned actor and accomplished speaker has a routine—some practical: don't drink milk or eat dairy products before speaking because it

creates mucus in the throat and blocks vocal projection—and some quirky: yawn three times before walking on stage because it increases the oxygen flow to the brain.

My theatre routine was to walk the stage before performances. I'd silently run through all my lines, my movement, and key moments in my head—putting myself into my character before I entered the space.

Although I don't do theatre anymore, I have a routine for when I give speeches. Before a speech I also walk the room. I want to know what the sight lines are, if there are obstacles between me and the audience, and where the timing lights are. When I am introduced it is past time to find out that a part of my talk won't work because of a potted plant or that the lectern cannot be moved as I'd hoped. Knowing the space before the speech allows me the flexibility to adjust and be in command the moment the audience sees me.



Prep Time Makes the Difference

As more clubs are encouraged to have virtual meetings (especially with club meetings being cancelled due to health concerns) it is important to develop a virtual routine. When I do a zoom meeting or teleconference, I also have a routine. I check all my equipment: computer, microphone, & camera—before the meeting (I don't want my laptop to update 5 minutes into my presentation—yeah, that's happened!).

Next, I remove distractions from in front of the camera. The biggest distraction is the background behind me. I've found that using a folding screen is the best way to block out my messy room. I simply put the screen behind my chair and, voila!, clean sightlines without laundry baskets!

Lastly, I sign on early—about 5-10 minutes or so. I do this because it helps me get into a meeting mindset and I don't feel so rushed. Once I am signed in, I mute my microphone to be sure there are no extraneous sounds to disrupt the

start of the meeting.

Of course, there are issues that will complicate meetings (like my cat walking across my keyboard or loudly insisting that it is dinner time when I am talking) but with a regular pre-meeting routine, you can minimize the effect those interruptions will have. . . like feeding the cat 15 minutes before the meeting.

As a speaker, develop a pre-speech routine. Find what works best for you—how you empower yourself, how you psych yourself up, and how to use your stage. Once you become comfortable before a talk, you will present yourself as being, looking, and sounding more confident. And confidence is its own reward.

Shoulders shaking. Heart racing. Eyes fluttering. My first speech before my peers was one of complete unfamiliarity. I wasn't sure if all the members would actually listen to what I had to say, or laugh me off the stage. What if I was just a bad speaker in general? Would I still be allowed into Future Stars?

Thoughts and questions like these flooded my mind in the days leading up to the big day. I had practiced my speech until I could recite it in my sleep, but nothing helped calm my nerves. I walked onto that stage for the first time feeling clammy and scared enough to run away.

BurnsMasters Toastmasters: 90

When Marv Serhan was asked to serve as the sponsor for a new corporate club in Vancouver, Washington, he elected to apply a project management focus on how that club establishment and charter process would take place. This is the first of a four-part Voices article that will outline many of the key tasks, milestones and deliverables that helped the BurnsMasters club achieve charter status in less than 90 days. All projects are team efforts and this club-charter initiative was certainly that with Patrick Locke, DTM, Bob Hall, EH5, and Greg Hawkins, MS3 coming aboard as co-sponsor and mentors to support this new-club launch initiative.

Here is a continuation of the task/deliverable listing from Part I of the BurnsMasters new-club project plan:

Identify and coordinate all activities through the local “champion” for this new club initiative.

Of all the 40+ employees at Burns & McDonnell Vancouver, only one had previous Toastmaster experience. He (Jeff Bourgeois) led the charge to investigate establishing a local, corporate club. In late August 2019 he approached the lead sponsor to request guidance on next steps to make this club become a reality. He stated:

“Marv, it was nice to meet you today. We are looking forward to starting a Toastmasters club of our own here at Burns and McDonnell, but we are just in the beginning steps. We have been talking about setting up a demonstrating meeting to tell our co-workers about Toastmasters, what

to expect and then gauge interest in forming a corporate club. You mentioned doing a demo meeting here at our office too. That could be a great way to show people what a club is all about and how a meeting is run. Thanks again for your support.” Jeff Bourgeois, PE Burns & McDonnell

Having a local champion to coordinate, plan, and disseminate information throughout the company is an absolute must. Jeff ultimately became the ‘Interim President’ and eventually, the first-term president of BurnsMasters. The lead sponsor coordinated all activities and communications through Jeff. His commitment, timely support of project initiatives, leadership, and professional example motivated others on his team to contribute to the success of the club’s early charter.

Schedule and conduct an “Orientation” meeting for all employees that can attend.

Now that the decisionmaker is fully informed and invested in the value of Toastmasters within his organization, and the ‘champion’ (Jeff Bourgeois) has been identified, the lead sponsor’s next challenge will be to sell the concept to all potential club members, i.e. Burns & McDonnell employees. This orientation meeting is essentially a sales pitch to share the significance of the Toastmaster learning experience and illustrate how enhanced communication skills will directly benefit the members of a company. At BurnsMasters there were 19 participants at this orientation meeting. The survey that followed had close to that number committed to join the club. Obviously, the presentation was well-received.

Note and this is important: This orientation presentation cannot be a canned talk. It must be delivered with authenticity, sincerity, spontaneity, clarity, plenty of examples, and crafted in such a way as to involve the audience. That involvement will create energy, enthusiasm, and help to illustrate how the Toastmaster program will lead to immediate learning. At BurnsMasters, the exercise involved impromptu speaking (table topics) followed immediately by informal evaluations – demonstrating how to offer constructive feedback. The participants immediately realized the significance of this learning approach, found it challenging, and enjoyable as well. But they also recognized the session to be a friendly environment within





which to learn. Here is what the champion wrote afterwards:

“Marv, thanks again for coming to our office today to give us an introduction to Toastmasters. I have had numerous people say that they enjoyed your presentation and are interested in joining based on what you said. I think the best thing I’ve heard this afternoon was from someone on the fence to join. He said he got nervous when you did the impromptu speech questions, even though he didn’t get called on. And since he got nervous, he knew Toastmasters was something he needed to do.” Jeff Bourgeois, PE, BurnsMasters ‘Champion’ Senior Civil Engineer, Burns & McDonnell.

Again, this orientation session is critical to jumpstart a new club initiative. Do it well and people will want to know more. Do it poorly, and it could derail your initiative.

Sponsor/Mentor team selection and leadership Rules of Engagement (ROE)

Per TMI two sponsors and two mentors can be involved in the new-club establishment process. However, it is essential that the lead sponsor take charge of his/her new club implementation team by specifically outlining



each person's responsibilities (either in writing or verbally [preferably both]) and direct their activities throughout each phase of the project. It must be clear that sponsor/mentor involvement requires action, contribution, and commitment. The sponsors/mentors are a team that has a leader, and that leader is the lead sponsor. Note that on occasion, problems result in sponsor, mentor, or coaching endeavors because this team-organizational responsibility matrix and ROE are not addressed up front. The lead sponsor should not assume anything; be specific to ensure your team fully understands your vision and requirements to manage the project. No such challenges applied to the sponsor/mentor team supporting BurnsMasters. Every member had a role to play and they performed their respective duties exceptionally well. Members were highly experienced, motivated and willingly performed their respective duties. Here's the team:

- Lead Sponsor: Marv Serhan, DTM (Past club president and Area Director)
- Co-Sponsor: Patrick Locke, DTM (Division G Director, club president, past Area Director)
- Mentor: Bob Hall, EH5, (Area 84 Director, President Professionally Speaking

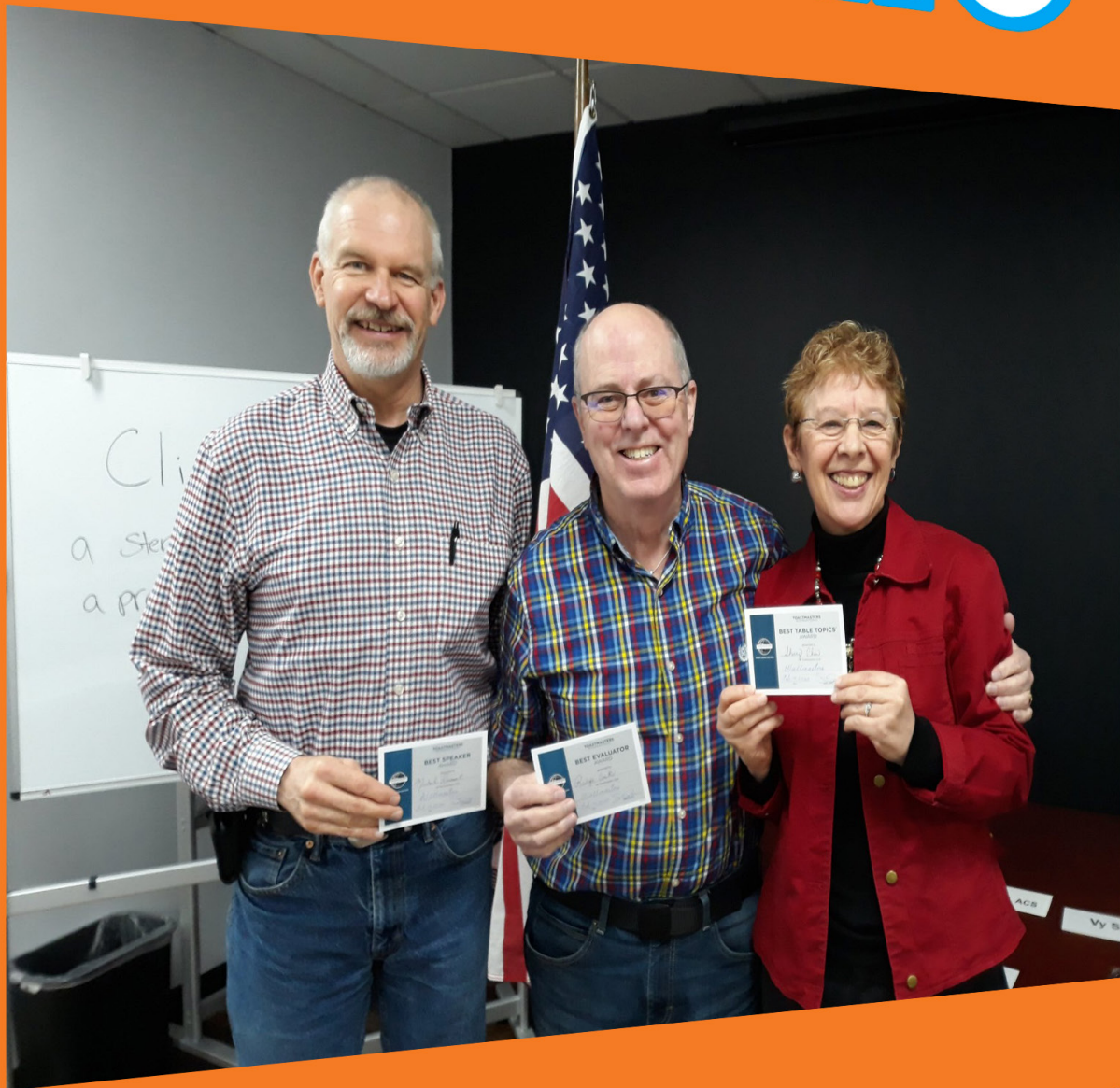

Recovering quickly, Leeza thought smugly – no problem. This is an easy fix. “Tell you what. From now on, you tell me the truth and I won’t

get mad. How’s that sound?”

“Promise?” asked her daughter.

“Absolutely”

We all have asked ourselves: Why do they lie? Don’t they trust us? You should know that lying is not human nature. Lying is a learned habit or, better said, we teach our children to lie. Deep breath ...

Leeza is not only a dear friend but a fellow Toastmaster and author of the book, *Connected Parent Empowered Child*. Having spent time with her and her kids, I’ve seen firsthand how powerful her tools and teachings are.

According to Leeza, teaching children how to be honest is not a one-shot deal, but a

process. Believing your children will help them feel trustworthy and know that you are dependable, no matter what. Finding alternative responses to anger and using more impactful tools grows your parenting toolbox. Applying consequences instead of punishment helps nurture behavior that feels good and teaches to respect others and grow into their full and positive potential.



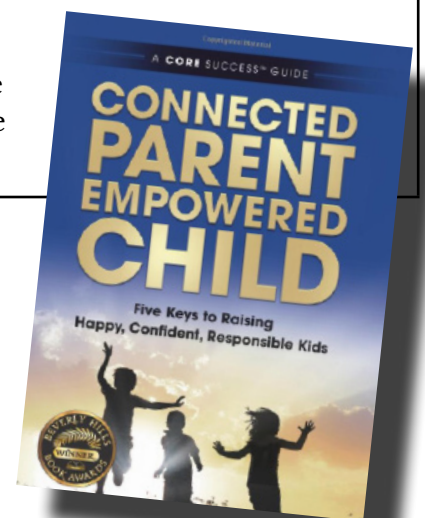

How to Stop Training Your Children to Lie	
Tip #1: Believe your kids	We are taught that kids want to push our buttons, make our lives hard, or will say anything to get what they want. Maybe sometimes. But never should we stake our entire relationship with them on these falsehoods. Believe your children and let them know you do. When you think they are lying, give them the benefit of the doubt and tell them so. This builds trust in you and confidence in your faith in them. If you believe in their honesty, they will learn to as well (even if it takes time) and grow the courage to tell the truth.
Tips #2: Dismiss anger as a tool	<p>Anger is not a sign of strength, but of helplessness. When you are sure and solid in your perspective and decisions, there's no need to be angry. You may not like what has happened, but anger becomes superfluous (small statement, big job).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Dance of Anger a book by Harriet Lerner is an amazing tool.• Strength Without Anger videos by Raun Kaufman give huge insights into revamping your anger code. <p>Be honest about your disappointment, sadness, or frustration. Not using anger as your tool of choice will have a far reaching impact, with encouraging honesty.</p>
Tip #3: Identify the consequences	<p>Punishment imposes restrictive, painful or unrelated actions to an event. Consequences are directly related and are educational, intending to train desired and useful behavior.</p> <p>Parenting Success Blueprint free online webinars that explains how to engage effective consequences. (Highly Recommended)</p>

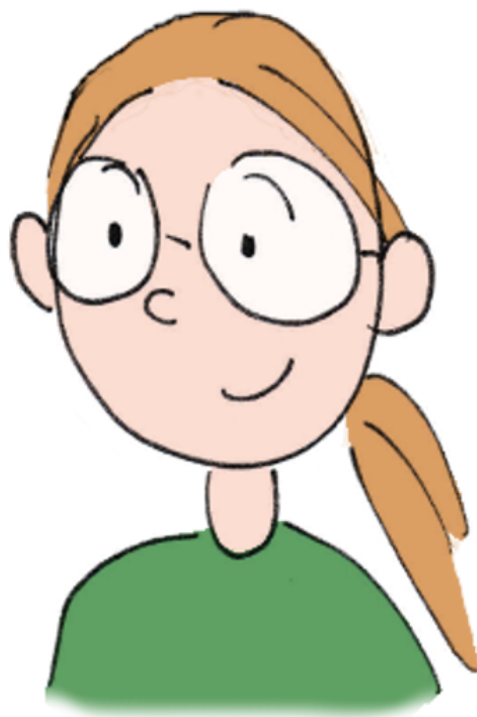

Choosing an Online Platform

Weighing Pluses, Minuses, and Interesting Points



A question I'm frequently asked is "What online platform should we use?" Fortunately, the saying "When the student is ready, the teacher will appear!" is apt. During a recent webinar organized by District 108, I was asked to speak about the HOW and WHY of online meetings. Ahead of me, District 95 Director Tobias Schlosser spoke about ONLINE PLATFORMS. He gave an excellent comparison of various options.

Based on these slides, Zoom is clearly the BEST online platform. From extensive personal experience, I concur with DD Schlosser's observations, namely:

- Zoom's FREE account can be used for 40 minutes before it times out. Clubs can take a short break then start the meeting again. Unlike other platforms that offer a FREE two-week trial period, after which you need to start paying!!
- Zoom is better with groups of 20-40 (and of course we are all aspiring for that!).
- Zoom is more versatile and works across the widest range of operating systems.

CAUTION! If you're holding virtual meetings, check your settings. Trolls have been Zoombombing public meetings by sharing their screen and playing disturbing, pornographic, or violent content.

A few simple settings changes will prevent this.

- Change screen sharing to "Host Only."
- Disable "Join Before Host" so people can't cause trouble before you arrive.
- Enabling "Co-Host" so you can assign others to help moderate.
- Disable "File Transfer" so there's no digital virus sharing.
- Disable "Allow Removed Participants to Rejoin" so booted attendees can't slip back in.
